

Bonneauville Considers Lake Water

Bonneauville Municipal Authority plans to tap into an existing private well in an effort to alleviate the borough's continuing water shortage.

Gregory Marvenko, chairman of the authority, said it plans to tap into a well owned by Roger Weaver, Gettysburg R. 5. The well is located near the grocery store in Bonneauville.

Marvenko said it will take probably four to six weeks before the Weaver well can be connected to the existing municipal water system.

Weaver's well produces approximately 10 gallons of water per minute or 14,400 per day, according to the authority chairman. The existing well, known as well number three, produces approximately 35,000 gallons per day.

Even with the added output of water from the Weaver well, the borough will be short of the 90,000 gallons-per-day recommended by the Department of Environmental Resources (DER).

The 90,000 gallons is based on a recommended 100 gallons-per-day for each of Bonneauville's estimated 900 residents.

One long-term alternative currently being examined by the authority is the possibility of securing water from Lake Heritage.

Bonneauville and Lake Heritage officials have held preliminary discussions on the possibilities of transporting water from the lake to the borough but Marvenko says, "we're waiting for them to get back to us."

For the moment then, the water shortage in Bonneauville continues — and enters into its seventh month.

For the third year, persons using the camping facilities at Coborus State Park will have available the services of a part time chaplain provided under the auspices of the Pennsylvania Council of Churches. The chaplaincy program runs each year from Memorial weekend to Labor Day weekend.

The chaplains this year are Scott Zimmerman, Harrisburg, a first-year student at Lutheran Theological Seminary, Gettysburg, and Arthur S. Zeigler, Daltown, who will be a student this fall at Lancaster Theological Seminary. Recruited and supervised by the Church of the Brethren, Southern District of Pennsylvania, these persons will be responsible for religious leadership and programming throughout the summer.

Their activity will include weekly visitation to the individual campsites, conducting a Sunday morning worship service each week, planning of special activities for campers and their families, and response to special needs of the camping public and Park Staff. Members of area churches assist the chaplain by providing leadership for children during the 9:15 a.m. worship hour each Sunday.

The chaplaincy program is sponsored by the Church of the Brethren, Southern District of Pennsylvania in cooperation with the Hanover Council of Churches. The Rev. Glenn Ludwig serves as the liaison between the Hanover Council of Churches and the Church of the Brethren.

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example of reverse vandalism" drew approval from the group. Sheads tour had started with the 155th Pennsylvania monument on the north slope of Little Round top to note the Zouave uniform of the statue on the monument to the Allegheny county regiment, and to note that the statue's right hand has been broken off.

The next stop was at the 146th New York Monument which notes that General George Meade, commander of the Union Troops at Gettysburg stood on that spot on Little Round Top to observe his forces on July 3, 1863.

At the stone near the 44th-12th New York, monument which bears the inscription "Strong Vincent fell here July 2, 1863," Sheads recalled that then Col. Strong Vincent was taken to the Bushman farm after being wounded, and died there. At the same time Mrs. Bushman was giving birth to a son, whom she named "Strong Vincent Bushman." Sheads said the widow of Strong Vincent, who was named a general just before he died, sent a cup to Strong Vincent Bushman. The local historian said he is seeking to discover what became of the cup.

G. Henry Roth read the obituary of Maj. Gen. S. Wylie Crawford which appeared in the Nov. 8, 1892, edition of the Gettysburg Star and Sentinel. Crawford commanded the Pennsylvania Reserves on Little Round Top and the avenue running through the Valley of Death at the base of Little Round Top is named after him. The avenue leads to Devil's Den. The obituary noted that "He fought at the Devil's Den and he bought the rocks after the war as a matter of sentiment, and his heirs will now own one of the most historic spots in the United States."

Crawford, a native of Franklin County, entered the army as an assistant surgeon. He was at Fort Sumter and during its bombardment commanded a battery. He was the last officer to leave Fort Sumter. He continued as a line officer, winning much fame in various battles including Antietam, Gettysburg, The Wilderness, and Petersburg. He rose to Major General during the war. He continued in the Army after the Civil War, reverting to colonel. He had reached the rank of brigadier general when he ultimately retired and moved to Philadelphia.

Conewago Twp. is looking for a roadmaster and it will pay \$10,400 a year.

At the township supervisors meeting Wednesday, Supervisor James Staub, who is now doing the job on a parttime basis, said he doesn't have time to do the work including supervision of the roads and employees and the office work required.

The supervisors, after discussion, voted to hire someone full time for the job, and set the proposed annual salary.

The Conewago supervisors voted to meet only once a month, the second Wednesday at 8 p.m., during the summer, resuming twice a month meetings in the fall.
